**STREAM/SWIM ADVISORY – LAWRENCE COUNTY**

The Lawrence County Health Department is monitoring several streams within the county. Results indicate some areas have higher E. Coli counts than EPA recommended limits.

E. Coli is a fecal coliform bacteria that lives in all human and animal intestines.

At present there is no federal or state standards for E. Coli densities in recreational waters. EPA's proposed standards for bacteria densities should not exceed 235 E. Coli per 100 milliliters of fresh water for full body contact.

The sources of water contamination are difficult to track to the point of source.

**THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDS NO SWIMMING IN STREAM AREAS THAT EXCEED EPA GUIDELINES.**
